"Having grown up with poverty as a child, I wanted to do something so that no other child would have to go through the same as me.

As a young girl, the only person able to keep me in clothing was my wonderful mum. She went without a coat, shoes and other items so me and my siblings could have them. When my mum died, aged 86, I wanted to start a unique charity.

When I was young, my mum could have used The Clothing Bank. That's why we're here for everyday people who are trying so hard, but are struggling.

All the items that are donated will be loved, worn and donated on again to help others in a similar situation.

Being in poverty doesn't define your life. In fact, it makes you that bit stronger and more determined to work hard for a better future."

"When both myself and husband were working, our family experienced poverty. We were £5 over the threshold of being able to get help, but after everyday expenses, we were struggling. Years later, Susan asked me if I wanted to start The Clothing Bank charity. I didn't think twice, but little did I know what was ahead of me.

Running a charity has been a massive challenge. I've learnt so many knew skills and pushed myself out of my comfort zone. When you feel passionately about something, it's so worth while. The Clothing Bank shouldn't be needed, but we are. As a community - online, and in person - we have all come together to help others. We have had our challenges along the way.

We have met so many lovely people and heard so many heartbreaking stories. But we have seen the smiles, the progression and the success stories of so many.

Tears and laughter have both flowed whilst we've found ways to run more efficiently and develop the charity as it's grown. For many, clothes have helped to open doorways – from job interviews to attending college or university."

The Clothing Bank continues to work extremely hard to relieve poverty pressures by donating clothing in packs to those who urgently need them.

This year has been especially challenging given the current cost-of-living crisis.

The **economic climate** has resulted in a significant increase to our referrals, whilst also affecting people's ability to give.

As demand for The Clothing Bank soars, so does the charity's efforts to support as many people as possible. This year, The Clothing Bank submitted planning permission for a new shed to enhance its storage capacity and ability to wash clothes. The intention is to introduce facilities (such as a toilet and tearoom) required to increase the number of volunteers allowed on-site.

Once this has been approved by the council, The Clothing Bank will be able to increase the number of packs sent out, supporting more families and individuals in need of the service. Looking ahead, The Clothing Bank also aims to diversify its income streams by sourcing vital funding from businesses, grants and trusts, in addition to funds generously raised and donated by individuals and community groups.

The charity's main aim is to fund the cost of postage - a considerable expenditure predicted to rise. The current average postage cost is £7.50 per parcel. Covering this cost would be an immense achievement.

Trustees

As an established charity with a **growing community**, it is important that we keep on going and keep supporting those who need us most in our community.

Community has, and will always be, at the heart of what we do. The Clothing Bank was founded in January 2020 by two volunteers, Sally and Sharon. Both had lived in poverty themselves, an experience which developed an empathy and understanding to support others. This raw, emotive connection and relatability is what makes the charity a huge success.

Locals readily volunteered to collect clothing for us by acting as a drop-off point. We were also able to welcome volunteers to sort and make packs up, helping us progress from sending 1,000 packs in our first year to 3,000 packs in our second. Soon, different organisations began reaching out to us, asking for help with clothing packs for their service users. By the end of last year, we had supplied 5,000 packs - mostly in Yorkshire, but up and down the country.

We now have an online Facebook community of over 81,000 followers, made up of volunteers, supporters and service users. The online community shares their circumstances and expresses the harsh reality that resonated with many. The Clothing Bank's online presence brought people together to build an understanding and supportive community hub.





- Working families struggling financially due to the cost-of-living crisis.
- The elderly transitioning to a care home with only the outfit they were sitting in.
- Hospital patients who only had the clothes they came in.
- · Victims of domestic violence.
- Babies and toddlers, growing out of their clothes at a rate their parents can't afford to keep up with.
- Primary-aged children needing school uniform and clothes to wear to prevent them from being bullied due to clothing poverty.
- Teenagers in high-school and college, starting a new journey and transitioning to young-adult life, simply wanting to fit in with their peers.
- University students struggling to make ends meet whilst studying to better their future.
- Ex-offenders on their release from prison, trying to turn a corner and progress in society.










Mission

Our mission is to **recycle more clothing** and provide each referred individual with 7 days of clothing; including shoes, coats, new underwear, pyjamas and a hygiene pack.

Now in our fourth successful year of operation, The Clothing Bank has first-hand knowledge of how vulnerable people are struggling more than ever to clothe themselves or their family after having to pay for everyday living costs. Due to the current climate, reflected by our ever-growing referrals list, we estimate this number to inflate.



We believe everyone deserves the right to have **good quality clothing** which enables people to:



The support we provide is **life-changing**; from preventing child bullying to providing interview clothes.

Right now, more than ever, people need the security of being able to clothe themselves and their loved ones. In turn, helping them reach their potential at the earliest stage.

We receive referrals directly through our website, social media channels and emergency telephone line. We also partner with other organisations and receive referrals from social workers, teachers, councils, baby banks, food banks and homeless shelters.

These vulnerable people include working adults and parents, people with a disability or terminal illness, victims of domestic violence, those in receipt of benefits, refugees, army veterans, pensioners, children and young people.

The Clothing Bank has a strong, active supporter base throughout Yorkshire and beyond, where members of our community have set up 127 volunteer and cities across Yorkshire and the UK.

We have supported 5,049 people including adults and children, with an even average between male and female recipients.

6 in 10 packs were sent to children living in poverty.

83% of our clothing packs have been distributed within Yorkshire where our main collection and distribution hub is located.

The remainder of our support is spread nationwide.













The Clothing Bank provides pre-loved clothing packs, toiletries and essentials to vulnerable children, young people and adults experiencing poverty. We have **strong relationships** with a number of community centred organisations where we fill gaps in their service.

Our charity currently accepts referrals from - and supplies to - the following groups:

- Food Kitchens: Knottingley Food Bank and Kippax Food Pantry

- Uniform Banks: Featherstone (Sharing is Caring), Wakefield (Small Steps), Bentley, and Airedale
- Hospitals: Scarborough (Clothing), Selby (Toiletries)
- Schools: Selby, Doncaster, Burton Salmon, Knottingley, Brotherton, Leeds. Including the provision of prom dresses and suits
- · Collages: Leeds, York, Wakefield
- Care Homes: Highfield Care Home in Castleford
















Clothes have helped children to be able to play, make friends and develop social skills with their peers. Clothes have given some dignity back to the elderly and veterans we support.

I volunteer as a drop-off point for my area and work at The Clothing Bank one day a week. The reason for me doing this is that when my oldest daughter was three months old, my husband was made redundant the week before Christmas.

Below, we have outlined what you have helped to fund, alongside future projects we hope to achieve with your support.

Ongoing Costs

- Staff wages
- Rented storage containers
- Toiletries and essential hygiene products
- Electricity, gas and water daily running costs
- Postal bags, labels and cost of delivery
- IT equipment including a laptop, printer and software
- Mobile phone contracts used to take referrals
- Two vans diesel, MOT, service and insurance
